What we want our children to gain from Art

- To learn how to think creatively and use a different part of the brain to help them think in a different way.
- To get better at manipulating paintbrushes, pencils etc in a controlled way.
- To become confident in having a go and being resilient when it doesn't go to plan.
- To support their learning in a visual way.
- To make decisions and persevere with their work.
- To help increase focus and concentration on a task.
- To be able to produce creative work, exploring their ideas and recording their experiences using different medias.
- To become proficient in drawing, painting, sculpture and other art, craft and design techniques
- To be able to evaluate and analyse creative works using the language of art, craft and design
- To know about great artists, craft makers and designers, and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms.
- To develop a love of art and an appreciation of different types of art.

Statutory Requirements Key stage two

- to create sketch books to record their observations and use them to review and revisit ideas
- to improve their mastery of art and design techniques, including drawing, painting and sculpture with a range of materials [for example, pencil, charcoal, paint, clay]
- to learn about great artists, architects and designers in history.

How we want to learn.

- By being creative with our learning eg linking artists to what we are learning about
- Asking key questions to focus us.

- Always start with looking at a piece of art/sculpture.
- Learning about art and design across subjects eg music, English, drama, science etc
- Using objects, visits, photographs, books, interactive resources to enhance what we learn.
- Taking part in 'take One Picture' each year.

Key questions

These are examples and could be used to begin with but the children can choose the direction they wish to take by coming up with their own key question choices. Each new topic could begin with the children choosing 4 or 5 key questions. These questions should not be closed, think about Who? What? Where? How? Were? EG:

- Do you like this piece of art/design? Why? Why not?
- How does it make you feel?
- What can you see in it?
- What do you notice about how the artist has created this piece of work?
- Why has the artist chosen to do this?
